The Beacon by Diane Less

As many of you know, I am in the sign business. Since 1972, I have been a commercial artist. I do all kinds of design work at my Spotted Horse Studio, including the basic designs of the Angels buildings and the World's Largest Cat Tree, which earned a spot in the 2019 Guinness Book of Records. I also designed our "home away from home" at the Canfield Fairgrounds. This is our #1 public outreach center. For six days, we talk to about 10,000 people!




The building was built with a cupola which had a flat top. I knew we needed something unique on the top of the building as I wanted people to be able to find us easily. Why not an 8 foot inflatable, lighted cat? He was adorable, and had the Angel sign on his chest. However, placing a huge cat on the roof of a building and then taking him down was a big pain to say the least. Unlike a real cat, he did not get up or down from there by himself! So, every year I had to coerce a crew of guys, rent a lift, and work out the timing to get him in place and take



him down. Through the whole fair week I would pray for no lighting failures. The blow-up cat was a landmark. I think one of my most memorable moments was washing my hands in the restroom and hearing the woman next to me tell a friend on the phone to meet them under the BIG CAT! We had made our mark!

The cat began to show signs of wear and tear, and moving him became more of a problem. I am very fortunate to have connected with super talented people and businesses through many years of project creation. Back in the 80's I met a talented illustrator, Fred Mozzy. We talked about coming up with an Angel logo with "Fair Flavor." Country western cowboys were a huge theme at the Canfield Fair. I myself have had horses at the fair since my childhood. I still show my ponies at the fair with Cindy Kingston, our amazing groomer. We are now known as the "cowgirls looking for trouble."

As kids, of course, the ultimate horse of our dreams was Trigger, the beautiful palomino of Roy Rogers. The image of this magnificent steed rearing up and Roy waving his hat was iconic! I called on Fred, and "Cowboy Kitty" was born! My original idea was to make a two-sided revolving sign cut to shape and internally lit. I went to my go-to sign manufacturer McHenry Industries with Fred's art, and presented my idea to Steve D'Apolito. Well, after getting a price tag of \$38,000, that idea went into the litter box.




I was determined to get the job done for the 2024 Canfield Fair within a reasonable price range. Oh, a cupola! This gave us a four sided sign which could be seen from all directions. I called my long time buddy, Sam Boak from Boak and Sons, as he is





Veterinary Technicians work alongside the veterinarians helping to provide quality care for the animals in the Spay and Neuter area and in the Wellness Clinic and Surgery. Veterinary technicians cover many jobs. We are

nurses in the exam room during wellness visits. We draw blood and run all the lab work. Changing hats in a heartbeat, vet techs become radiologists that take and process the radiographs. Resident Cats Wait for Forever Homes

What is a “resident” cat? They are any cat over 5 years of age, or in the shelter over 6 months. Some of the cats here currently over 6 months are here for various reasons. Many are kittens who were shy, or just simply haven’t met their “person”.



Junie

Junie has been with us since June 2021. She is a shy cat, (now almost 5 years old), who has taken a long time to feel comfortable with humans. She will need an adopter that is patient and will give her time to know

what it is like to be in home after so long in our shelter.

Kabootle has been with us since he was a kitten, (now 3+ years old), and this is all he has ever known. He is an odd fella, who takes time to trust and will allow to be petted if you walk “backward” to him. Cats have

quirks, and he sure does! He too will need someone to understand that he will not be comfortable in his new home overnight. He will need extra time, patience and love.

Snip has been with us since March of 2022, one of 3 kittens (both have found homes) that were part of a TNR project. We received

a call that these 3 kittens were too nice and the colony they were found in would not be good for them, so we had them brought to us to find them forever homes.

Snip wants so much attention, but still hasn’t quite figured out how to accept allowing a gentle pet. He will dance around you, just out of reach. He adores other cats, and

would do awesome if he had a home with other cats (or even one from his adoption room).

Fleetwood came to us as a kitten in Spring of 2022. He came with littermates, and was the shyest of the group. Once he knows you, he will curl up on his back and just look at you with his big **Snip** beautiful eyes!



Many shelters are filled with brown tabbies and black cats, as these are the most common color/pattern. Shy ones are overlooked a lot because they just stay at arm length. They don’t “catch the eye”, or other cats are all about garnering all the attention when

potential adopters come to visit. What you see in the shelter is only a small fraction of what is brought to us that need forever homes. Many cats are in foster homes. One shelter visit is a small picture of what cat’s personality truly is. Many long term residents have found homes, and we are happy to report that they have blossomed in a home setting!

Many of those adopters have said that they discover new things about them and they are some of the best pets they have ever had. Do cats like them think to themselves, “Wow, I can really be me. I can finally relax and feel safe!”? Committing to a cat or even dog who has been in a rescue/ shelter for a long period time not only gives this animal a chance of a better life to be loved, but opens a space in the shelter/rescue for another to be saved also! 
because she will let you know when someone is at the doors to the dog kennels.



However, this year was different. Lois had a special request for her family. You see, Lois was diagnosed with a very serious illness. Her wish was for Ernie to earn his rightful spot on the cover of the 2025 Angels for Animals Calendar. Ernie has been watching over his mom while she has been sick, and now, the cat she rescued 20 years ago has become her "Angel." This dedicated family were determined to make her wish come true and voted relentlessly until the end.

Sergeant Stubby, who came in a very close second place, also has a special story to tell. His dog mom, is Jillian Zidian. She has high functioning autism. She shared her story of searching for a service dog to help with her anxiety. After a search for the right place to find her companion, Jillian found a place called Medical Mutts in Indianapolis, Indiana. Medical Mutts takes



rescue dogs and trains them to be service dogs. Jillian wanted "Stubby" to be on the cover to recognize him for becoming her hero, like his namesake. He was named after a dog who served during World War II that saved countless men during a nighttime gas attack. Jillian also wanted to share awareness of the great work being done at Medical Mutts who matched her with Stubby, providing training and support as he transitioned to be her service dog. All dogs not qualifying as a service dog are also adopted out to families.

Pets and Obesity

The 2022 US pet obesity prevalence survey found that 61% of cats and 59% of dogs are overweight or obese. This same study notes that 84% of dog owners and 70% of cat owners feel their pets are at a healthy weight. There are so many problems both dogs and cats can have from being overweight.*

In dogs:

- Decreased quality of life and life expectancy. On average, the lifespan of overweight pets is 2 years shorter and they are predisposed to heart disease and some types of cancer.
- Osteoarthritis is a direct result of excess weight on the joints.
- A weakened immune system, making pets more susceptible to infections.
- Overweight predisposes the development of a tracheal collapse in dogs of small breeds.
- Heart problems. Although dogs are not at risk of the heart diseases that humans are, excess weight can impact their heart rate and increase their risk of high blood pressure.
- Increased risk of disk herniation. This is even more likely in breeds with a predisposition, such as dachshunds.
- Worsening of some diseases such as diabetes, pancreatitis or allergies. Obesity may increase inflammatory processes.



In cats:

- Decreased quality of life and life expectancy, just like dogs.
- Osteoarthritis is a direct result of excess weight on the joints.
- Diabetes. An obese cat may become less sensitive to the effect of insulin and, over time, develop an abnormally high blood sugar level.
- Urinary problems. Obesity has been identified as a risk factor for feline urological syndrome, which causes pain and difficulty urinating in cats who have it.
- Skin problems. Cats which are too fat have difficulty licking some parts of their bodies, especially the base of their backs, to get them really clean. As a result, we can see an accumulation of dandruff and sometimes knots forming.** These are preventable issues and should not be



ignored. Everyone always says they wish they could have had their pet for longer and in many issues you can have the pet for extra years simply by being a responsible owner and taking charge of your pet's diet and weight. Diet and exercise can really make a huge difference in your pet's life but it is up to you the owner to make a difference.

The time has come to take a look at the upkeep and maintenance of our entire facility. Our “Warmth and Comfort” Campaign will provide funds to update the heating and cooling system to keep our shelter animals and our staff comfortable. Keeping up with the maintenance on our entire facility is critical to providing a safe and comfortable “temporary home” for the animals that take residence here. Our shelter has provided a temporary home for many homeless, unwanted and abandoned dogs and cats and has been well loved over the years, but its age is beginning to show. The “Warmth and Comfort” Campaign is our pathway to updating the current facility by making critical repairs and improvements needed to keep our shelter and facility safe and comfortable for our staff, volunteers, and animals.

Part of our focus is the H-Vac system (heating and cooling system) in the shelter. The roof has developed leaks in several locations. The lighting is outdated. The ceiling is stained and water drips show up here and there. We need to evaluate our original kennels and cages to determine the renovations needed to make our shelter animals more comfortable. We have successfully reached our goal in providing a veterinary service within the Angel Wing to care for shelter animals as well as privately owned pets. Now, as we create a plan for the future, we need to care for what we already have.

An efficient heating and cooling system will help us both financially, and with our goal for comfort. Seeking new options for housing will improve our environment for our shelter animals. We need your help to make these necessary renovations.


