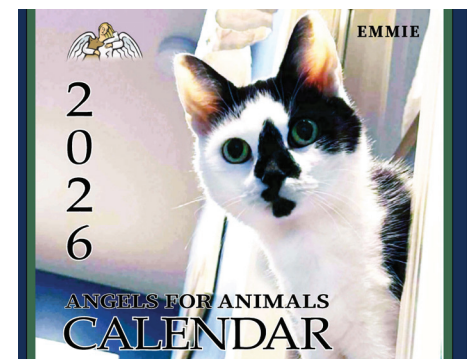

The Perfect Match by Reagan Bailey, Assistant Dog Manager

Rescuing dogs can be a thankless and heartbreaking endeavor. You see things you wish you never had.



You encounter dogs who have been through so much that they cannot be saved. You also run into people that make you so very aware that evil does exist in the world. It can also be the most rewarding and healing adventure that you ever undertake. Watching a dog who had given up blossom and thrive with your

help, seeing people give all of their extra time at the expense of their families and social lives, seeing the sick and starving animals change to healthy and hopeful; that is what makes this all worth it. Then, out of nowhere, along comes a story that is almost too good to be true and makes you realize that you really are making a difference.

On Labor Day weekend, 2025, I received a call regarding a mama dog and a litter of 5 twelve-week-old puppies surrendered to the pound. County dog pounds are routinely full to the brim with unwanted dogs whether strays or owner surrenders. In short, too many dogs, not enough space, not enough money, not enough help. In this case, they realized that the pound wasn't the best place for this little family, hence reaching out to Angels for assistance. After a few phone calls, shared videos, and logistical considerations, we gave an emphatic YES, and started to rearrange our intake area to house Mama and her five puppy girls. We coordinated with our amazing shelter vet to give them all intake exams, and to make sure our kennel staff was up to the job. This mom and puppies were the most amazing little family groups ever: all super social, incredibly friendly and outgoing, and ALL GIRLS! They appeared to be a very cool mix of German Shepherd, Australian Shepherd, Border Collie, Collie, and a few teaspoons of this and that (since that time, DNA tests have proven us 100% correct!). Mama was named Violet, and her kids - Penelope, Francesca, Eloise, Charlotte, and Daphne.

Interest was HUGE in these pups and their mom. Once Violet and four of the pups were posted, applications came flying in. There was one baby who had to wait a little longer for her moment in the sun - Eloise.

Apparently, Violet (mom), who is a fawn merle, had been bred by a boy who was also merle. Generally speaking, in a litter of double merle puppies, 1 in 5 is affected by being "double merle". While most of the pups were perfectly normal, our little Eloise had some issues related to that inadvisable cross. It is often characterized by a lot of white coloring (Eloise was the only spotty pup in the group), and can also affect eyes as well as hearing. Eloise could hear just fine, but one of her eyes just wasn't really an eye and certainly didn't perform the function of an eye.

Our amazing vet decided immediately upon examination, that in order to avoid problems later, her eye would need removed. So, as it happened, Eloise wasn't posted as available for about a week or so after



her sisters. From there, the story became, in a word, "magical" - just meant to be.

We had received upwards of 30 applications on the various pups and were busy setting up meet and greets with their likely families. Mom was cleared by medical and adopted immediately by the first (but 100% amazing) woman who had met her. Each puppy met their perfect match and made their way to their new homes. It was in the middle of the puppy mayhem that Eloise's first application came in. It was from a local family, a good application for certain. A big brother dog for Eloise to play with and learn from, and two young kiddos to grow up with. Even before I could contact the family, Mom sent an email about their unique situation that was equal parts a punch in the gut, and evidence that perfect matches DO exist.

It involved her very young daughter, and the reason why she felt Eloise was exactly what was missing from their family. The story of an incredibly brave young girl as told by her equally brave mom.

"Aubriella (Aubie) a 3-year-old little girl, had dealt with some scary things in her short life. At just 2-years-old, just 2 weeks after her 2nd birthday, she was diagnosed with a rare childhood cancer known as retinoblastoma. After further testing, it was discovered not only had the cancer affected her left eye, but that there was also a tumor in her right eye. Because of the tumor's advanced stage in the left eye causing the retina to become completely detached a decision was made that she



would need to have her eye removed to prevent any further damage or metastasis to further organs. The focus now was treating the smaller tumor in the right eye and saving the remaining vision she had with that eye. This would be done through radial plaque therapy, 6 rounds of systemic chemotherapy, as well as intravitreal treatments to the right eye. Over the last year and a half, Aubie went through chemotherapy, various exams, procedures, and treatments at Cleveland Clinic Children's. Aubie is so full of life and personality, and will brighten any room she enters, while also being the bravest most resilient child I know. So, when I saw Angels for Animals Facebook post about Eloise, the last of the Bridgerton themed puppies, who also had to have her left eye enucleated due to a condition that was beyond her control, I just thought this was a perfect match for us. When I showed Aubie the picture of Eloise her first response was "Awe look at the cute puppy!" which was then followed up with "Look she has one eye like me!" At that moment I knew not

only did our family need this sweet puppy, but most of all Aubie needed her. To have a best friend who was like her, and to teach her that it is okay to be different, and sometimes go through scary things; but you shouldn't let that define who you are or what you can do."

Don't get me wrong - the adoption application was excellent, but THIS? This made it truly special. A once in a lifetime kind of placement that makes your heart sing. The day came when the family, including their current dog, Chase, came to meet Eloise to see if it was a fit. It was love at first sight. They all loved Eloise, and, admittedly, the moment Aubie turned her attention on me, and plopped herself in my lap, I fell in love as well. Aubie is an amazing, resilient, brave little girl who can charm the socks off of anyone. The first thing she did was pick out a few toys for her new pup. She renamed her Nala.

In all the years that I have placed dogs into new homes. I have made some incredible friends and have met some of the most interesting people. I have to say, this placement ranks up there with the top of the top. When it is right, it is right. Once again, finding a special place for a special dog has led me to meet people I consider myself so very lucky to now count as friends. As for Eloise/Nala, Aubie's wonderful mama sums it all

up: "Flash forward to now. Aubie and Nala (previously Eloise) are the best of friends! Aubie loves to lay on the floor with her and watch movies on the tablet together. Aubie has even started giving Nala

eye exams with her play medical kit while dressed up as a doctor. Telling her that everything is okay and not to be scared. I truly believe these two girls can do everything and anything they want to together while not letting their disability decide for them. They needed each other. Together they will take on the world together and conquer it all!"



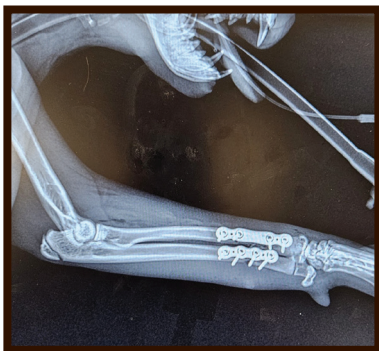

Statistics for the number of homeless dogs and cats in 2024 are estimated to be a staggering 5.8 million. Rescue/shelters/pounds are doing their best to care for them medically/mentally, and find them permanent loving homes. Every year, Angels for Animals, with the much needed and appreciated donations, raise funds to help offer low cost medical wellness and spay/neuter programs. The goal is make it possible for pets to get the vet care needed



to be able to keep their pets happy and healthy. But, there are still many who can't keep their pets, don't spay/neuter, and leave their pets behind, becoming homeless strays that find their way to us. Many cats and dogs this year, have come in with outstanding personalities, but with some medical issues. Our vets not only do our intake exams for shelter cats and dogs, but provide extra surgeries to make them feel better, medicate when needed, and do so much more with the ultimate goal of finding a forever home. Roughly 60 animals (mostly cats) have needed extra medical care :

- A young cat fell from a tree. There were fractures



to one leg, that were aligned and a plate was installed to stabilize the leg.

- 50 plus cats had dentals including extractions
- 2 Kittens - Limb amputations: Two kittens came in

with broken legs that were beyond saving. One needed a tail amputation.

- 3 dogs - Entropion: The upper or lower eyelids are rolled inward. The eyelids then irritate the cornea and the end result is pain and eventual corneal ulceration.
- 2 cats so far this year - Eye enucleation - some cats have come to us with eye infections that did damage that could not be reversed. To relieve the pain, the eye of the cat was removed.
- FHO surgery on a young cat: Femoral Head Osteotomy, is a surgical procedure that aims to restore pain-free mobility to a diseased or damaged hip by removing the head and neck of the femur (the long leg bone or thighbone).



In a nutshell, our vets are not only taking care of your pets, they all pitch in to care for the shelter dogs and cats in between their spay/neuter surgeries, dentals, wellness/sick appointments, etc.. Veterinary Technicians - Their Roles in Animal Care

Just as human doctors have their support staff, veterinarians also have support staff to keep things running smoothly throughout the day. We are going to focus today on the veterinary technician. As stated in the March 5, 2020 American Animal Hospital Association publication, Veterinary Technicians are educated professionals that help veterinarians by providing nursing care, advocate for the patients in their care, assist in anesthesia and surgery and perform diagnostic procedures. While it is true that they get to see and cuddle the occasional cute puppy or kitten, the veterinary technician's job encompasses much more than that.

Veterinary Technicians attend a 2 to 4 year college program where they receive training in radiology, microbiology, pharmacology, surgical assisting and parasitology. They must then, after college, pass a standardized test called the VTNE, veterinary technician national exam. This test makes sure the technicians have the appropriate knowledge and skills needed to perform their job effectively. Veterinary Technicians have a license that must be



maintained by taking continuing education classes to keep their license current. Veterinary Technicians continually have to stay informed about the new drugs that are being used and

new surgical procedures that they may need to assist with. Just like human nurses Veterinary Technicians can specialize as well. The specialties include anesthesia, internal medicine, behavior, nutrition, clinical practice, surgery, emergency and critical care, equine care, pathology, dentistry and zoology. These specialties require 3 to 5 years working in that area of specialty, along with case studies and additional continuing education. These are highly trained professional medical staff.

As a veterinary technician, a typical day in a wellness and surgical practice involves working with the owners and obtaining information as to the pet's health. This usually involves getting weights, temperatures and a history on why the patient is seeing the vet. They then will draw up vaccines, or medications and can calculate the drug dosages needed as requested by the veterinarian. They are the phlebotomists that draw the required samples of blood to run the tests requested by the veterinarian. They also are trained in radiology to take quality x-rays. They are the dental hygienists that clean the teeth, and assist the veterinarian with surgical extractions.



Veterinary technicians are also advocates to assure their patients are getting the best quality of care possible. They sit with their patients during recovery from surgery, and make sure they are comfortable and monitor their pain control.

Lastly, they help with euthanasia, and are a shoulder to cry on and a hand to hold during the hard times of pet ownership. There are many times they have to wipe away the tears for a long-loved patient they had to say good-bye too. Veterinary technicians are in this job field because they have a love for animals and the desire to help them. So, THANK YOU to all the veterinary technicians for taking on this job! Keeping Pets Safe During the Most Wonderful Time of the Year

The holiday season brings sparkling lights, family gatherings, delicious meals, and festive décor, but for our pets, it can also bring a surprising number



of hidden dangers. At Angels for Animals, we see firsthand how quickly a joyful celebration can turn into an emergency when a curious dog or cat crosses paths

with a hazardous decoration, food, or plant. By understanding the risks and taking a few simple precautions, you can ensure that your home stays safe for every member of the family, furry ones included.

1. The Temptation of Holiday Foods

For many pets, the biggest holiday hazard sits right on the dining room table.

Toxic Treats

Dogs and cats are naturally drawn to rich smells, and holiday meals offer plenty of tempting options. Unfortunately, many holiday favorites can cause serious harm:

- **Chocolate:** Contains theobromine, which is toxic to pets even in small amounts. Dark chocolate poses the greatest risk.
- **Xylitol:** A sweetener found in sugar-free baked goods, candies, and peanut butter. Even tiny amounts can cause life-threatening hypoglycemia in dogs.
- **Onions, garlic, and chives:** Common in stuffing and casseroles, but extremely toxic to both dogs and cats.
- **Alcohol:** Spilled cocktails or unattended drinks can lead to dangerous intoxication for pets.



- **Fatty foods:** Ham, turkey skin, gravy, and buttery dishes may lead to pancreatitis, a painful and sometimes fatal inflammation of the pancreas.

Safe Alternatives: If you want your pet to join in the celebration, offer plain cooked turkey, unsalted green beans, or pet-safe holiday treats. Better yet, prepare a special holiday chew or puzzle toy to keep them occupied during mealtime.

2. Dangerous Holiday Decorations

Festive decorations transform a home, but they also present risks that many families overlook.

- **Christmas Trees:** A decorated tree is irresistible to many pets, especially cats.
- **Tree Water:** Often contains fertilizers, bacteria, or preservatives that can upset a pet's stomach.
- **Ornaments:** Glass ornaments can break and cause cuts. Glitter-coated, dangling, or edible ornaments tempt curious paws and mouths.
- **Tinsel and Ribbons:** Cats, in particular, love to bat and chew on shiny strands. Ingesting tinsel can cause intestinal blockages requiring emergency surgery. To pet-proof your tree, secure it to prevent tipping, place fragile



- ornaments up high, and skip tinsel entirely. A simple tree skirt or a barrier around the base can also prevent access to water and lower branches.
- **Lights and Electrical Cords:** Chewing holiday lights or cords can lead to electric shock, burns, or even fire hazards. Tape cords to baseboards, use protective cord covers, and unplug decorations when you're out of the house.
- **Candles:** Open flames and wagging tails don't mix. Opt for battery-powered LED candles for a safer glow.

3. Toxic Holiday Plants

Many traditional holiday plants are beautiful, but not pet-friendly.

- **Poinsettias:** Low toxicity, but can cause drooling, vomiting, or skin irritation.



- **Mistletoe:** Highly toxic and ingestion may lead to cardiovascular problems.

- **Holly: Berries and leaves** can cause severe stomach upset.

- **Lilies:** Extremely

dangerous for cats. Even a small amount can cause kidney failure.

If you love the look of holiday plants, consider pet-safe alternatives such as rosemary, Christmas cactus, or high-quality artificial options.

4. Guests, Stress, and New Routines

While the holidays are full of social gatherings, your pet may not share the enthusiasm.

- **Overstimulation and Anxiety:** New faces, loud voices, suitcases, and changes in routine can make pets anxious. Signs of stress include pacing, hiding, whining, or unusual clinginess. Provide your pet a quiet “safe zone”, a separate room with water, bedding, and toys. Consider using calming aids such as pheromone diffusers, slow music, or enrichment puzzles.
- **Open Doors, Escapes, and Lost Pets:** With guests coming and going, doors are often left open, giving pets easy opportunities to slip outside. During events:

- Use baby gates to create barriers.

- Keep pets in secured rooms.

- Ask guests to be mindful of entrances and exits

- Ensure microchip/tag information is current.

5. Cold Weather and Outdoor Risks

Not all dangers are indoors. Winter weather brings its own challenges, especially for pets that spend time outside.

- **Cold Exposure:** Even breeds with thick coats can struggle in freezing temperatures. Hypothermia and frostbite are real risks. If it's too cold for you, it's too cold for your pet.
- **Antifreeze:** Ethylene glycol, commonly found in antifreeze, is highly toxic and has a sweet taste that

attracts animals. Clean spills immediately and store containers securely.

- **Ice-Melt Chemicals:** Salt and ice-melt products can irritate paw pads or cause illness if licked. After walks, rinse or wipe your pet's paws thoroughly.

6. Holiday Travel with Pets

If your holiday plans include travel, extra preparation is key.

- Use a secure carrier or seat-belt harness.
- Pack familiar bedding or toys to reduce anxiety.
- Keep your pet's medical records and emergency contacts handy.
- Never leave pets unattended in a vehicle during winter—temperatures drop quickly.

Boarding or pet sitting may be safer for pets that are anxious travelers or easily stressed.

7. When in Doubt, Call for Help

Accidents can happen even in the most careful homes.

If you suspect your pet has ingested something dangerous or is acting unusually, contact:

- Your veterinarian
- The nearest emergency animal hospital
- The Pet Poison Helpline (24/7): 855-764-7661

Prompt action can make all the difference.

Many families request donations to Angels for Animals, in lieu of flowers, when a loved one dies. It is a wonderful, lasting tribute that benefits the shelter in so many ways.

When we receive a memorial donation, the front office will send the donor a thank you letter. They will also send the deceased's loved ones a family letter. They wait about a month to ensure all the people who donated are included in the family letter. The names of donors will be posted on our website at www.angelsforanimals.org.

It is a wonderful, final and loving tribute to those animal lovers who have passed. These donations help our shelter by affording us the resources we need to get our furbabies permanent loving homes.

Memorial bricks are also available for purchase and are placed in our walkway between Andrews Hall and the Angels for Animals Shelter. Dr. Rocco Mele - An Anniversary to Celebrate by Dr. Rocco Mele, DVM & Kim Smith

We are preparing to celebrate Dr. Mele's 1 year anniversary at Angels For Animals. In that year, he has performed several amazing surgeries: mass removals, amputations, orthopedic surgeries and many innovative procedures including, oral fracture reconstruction, oral cancer and dental implants.

Dr. Mele is a Youngstown, Ohio native and graduated from The Ohio State University. He has practiced in Florida, Hawaii and Arizona for the past 45 years.



Advanced dentistry and oral surgery has been a major focus of his career. Dental care is very important and has many benefits to prolong the life of your pet. Plaque forms on the teeth after eating, attracting bacteria. If plaque is not removed quickly it will turn to tartar which attaches to the teeth like cement. Once the hard tartar forms, it causes tissue regression, bone damage and eventual loss of teeth. Some signs of dental disease that may indicate your pet needs medical attention are oral pain, bleeding gums, bad breath, dropping food and swelling below the eyes. Untreated dental disease can lead to kidney, liver and heart valvular damage.

So, what happens if you think your pet needs dental care? At Angels for Animals, we complete a dental consultation and comprehensive oral exam developing a tentative diagnosis and treatment plan. The treatment plan will be discussed at length and any questions will be answered at that time. During the consultation an estimate for the procedure will be given and an appointment can be made. When you bring your pet in on the day of surgery, we will draw a pre-surgical blood panel to evaluate the animal to make sure they are

healthy for the procedure and their liver and kidneys are able to handle anesthesia. Once we have the bloodwork results, we sedate the pet and maintain them on anesthetic gas throughout the procedure. Dental x-rays are taken of the entire mouth and all teeth are evaluated to ensure that we are only removing teeth that have problems. After dental x-rays are taken, Dr. Mele calls the owner to discuss extractions and procedures needed while the registered veterinary technicians perform the cleaning and polishing of the teeth. Then, Dr. Mele will perform the dental surgery and extraction of problematic teeth. When the dental procedure is completed the patient will be removed from the anesthetic machine and is monitored very closely while recovering. The patient will be discharged later in the afternoon with home care instructions, and any post surgical medications needed. If there is ever a question about a surgical procedure, it is always wise to have a consultation, and that way the pet can be evaluated and we can let you know the best way to treat them.

During a professional dental cleaning, the veterinarian thoroughly examines and evaluates your pet's entire mouth and oral structures. They also clean your pet's teeth. Steps involve:

- **Conscious oral exam** — The veterinarian will examine your pet's mouth, looking for dental disease signs and any abnormalities.
- **Blood work** — A professional veterinary dental cleaning requires anesthesia, so the veterinary team will perform blood work to ensure your pet has no underlying health issues that would complicate the procedure.
- **Anesthesia** — The veterinary team will place an intravenous (IV) catheter and induce anesthesia, monitoring your pet closely throughout the procedure until they are fully recovered.
- **Dental X-rays** — More than 50% of a tooth's structure is below the gumline and can only be seen on X-rays.

- **Teeth scaling** — The veterinary team uses specialized dental instruments to remove plaque and tartar from the tooth surface above and below the gumline.
- **Polishing** — Scaling leaves microabrasions on the tooth surface, and the veterinary team will polish your pet's teeth so bacteria cannot adhere to these lesions.
- **Periodontal probing** — The veterinary team will probe around each tooth, looking for abnormally deep areas and pockets.
- **Extractions** — In some cases, dental disease damages the tooth and the supporting structures, and extractions are necessary.
- **Antibiotic treatment** — The veterinarian will prescribe antibiotics if your pet's dental disease is extensive, especially if they require an extraction.



Why does my pet need anesthesia for a veterinary dental cleaning?

- Have you seen advertisements for anesthesia-free dental cleanings? Have you been tempted? It's important to know that these services do not effectively address your pet's dental health.
- Emily Singler, VMD, a veterinarian and AAHA's Veterinary Content Specialist, said "without anesthesia, there's no way to fully assess and address your pet's dental health. Non-anesthetic dental cleanings may make your pet's teeth look and smell better in the short term, but they create a false sense of security and don't really make your pet's mouth healthier."
- Anesthesia is necessary for several reasons:
 - **Less stress** — From your pet's perspective, a dental cleaning involves a team of strangers using sharp, pointy instruments near their face. Anesthesia helps prevent unnecessary stress and anxiety.
 - **Stay still!** — The veterinary team needs your pet to remain perfectly still so they can thoroughly examine their mouth and remove plaque/tartar.
 - **Going the distance** — If your pet is not anesthetized, the veterinary team can't remove the bacteria under the gum line, where the most

damage occurs. For a complete dental cleaning, which is needed for your pet's health, they need to be anesthetized.

- **Safety first** — Anesthetizing your pet helps prevent injury to your furry pal and the veterinary team. Even the best-behaved pet may lash out or respond negatively due to fear, stress, and anxiety.

How can I take care of my pet's teeth at home?

At-home dental care is also necessary to keep your pet's mouth healthy. Plaque starts to accumulate only hours after your pet eats, so yearly dental cleanings aren't enough to prevent dental disease. Ways you can promote your pet's dental health include:



- **Daily brushing** — Brushing your pet's teeth daily is the best way to help reduce plaque accumulation. Use a pet-specific toothbrush with soft bristles that will not irritate your pet's gums, and never use human toothpaste, which is often toxic to pets. Pet-specific toothpaste comes in flavors such as poultry, beef, seafood, and peanut butter.
- **Dental chews** — Chewing can help remove some plaque from your pet's teeth. Choose dental treats and chews with the Veterinary Oral Health Council's seal of approval that guarantees the product is effective.
- **Water additives** — Additives that you put in your pet's water can help reduce plaque accumulation.
- **Dental diets** — Dental diets are specially formulated to help remove plaque and reduce accumulation. Ask your veterinarian if this food type would benefit your pet.

The next time your pet gives you a sloppy kiss, pay attention to the smell of their breath. Contact Dr. Rocco to schedule a dental exam to

We have really tried to make Angels a one stop animal center! Come on out to visit our retail area to see the huge variety of items we offer!



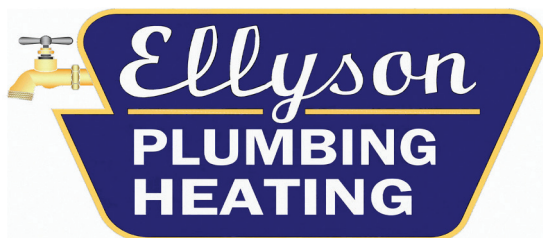

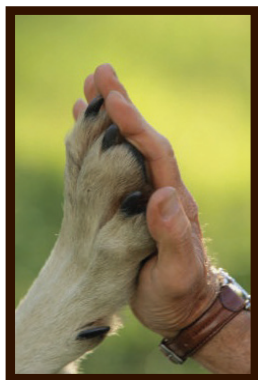
